Nearly a decade ago a chestnut foal that would grow up to be named Sandburr was born just behind Hutchins' home near Fredericksburg, where, deep in the heart of the Texas Hill Country, she and her husband, Tom, own 50 acres and a baker's dozen of Thoroughbreds. On the night Sandburr was foaled, Hutchins had checked on his mother, the stakes-placed Silent Screen mare Lone Star Stella, several times and knew the baby was coming. She went inside to watch television, and when she came back out, the mare had done the work for her.

"There he was, a big pile of red and white," Hutchins recalled. "I sat down in my purple nightgown and put him on my lap and the rest is history."

And that's not an overstatement. Now a 10-year-old, Sandburr has earned his place in history among the top 25 highest-earning Texas-breds of all-time. And he did most of it the hard way, in allowance and claiming contests on the Texas circuit. In his 38 starts for Hutchins, he won seven times. But on April 7, 2006, at Sam Houston Race Park, Hutchins ran the Sandpit gelding for a \$20,000 tag, and he was claimed by trainer Michael Stidham for Feel The Thunder Stable, owned by Illinois-based racing newcomer Marty Nixon.

After that race, Sandburr stepped up his

game, winning the first stakes of his career at age 7, fittingly enough on Texas Champions day at Sam Houston Race Park. He soon added four other stakes victories to his record, including the 2007 Louisiana Breeders' Cup Handicap at Fair Grounds. From 62 career starts thus far, Sandburr has found the winner's circle in 16 races and hit the board 19 other times. His earnings total \$476,321.

Even though Hutchins no longer owns Sandburr, Stidham and Nixon keep her in the loop on all of the gelding's activities, even sending the win photos that cover Hutchins' refrigerator.

"They have just taken me into the gang," she said. "If I'm where Sandburr is, I go to the stable. They give me carrots and peppermints for him. I get to talk to him and pet him and he always knows me. They've just been wonderful to me, and they take superb care of him."

She often joins them in the winner's circle after Sandburr's races, a world away from her hometown of Montgomery, Ala., where as a kid she paid \$2 for her first riding lesson. Those early lessons instilled in her a love of horses that still shows in everything she does at age 63, all the way down to the socks decorated with images of horses that she wears underneath her work boots

Stealth Cat Texas Horse of the Year; Adger Honored

The Texas Thoroughbred Association honored the top performers of 2008 at its annual Horse Racing/Breeding Conference and Annual Meeting in Dallas Jan. 9-10. The winner of the prestigious T.I. "Pops" Harkins Award went to John Adger, racing manager of Bob and Janice McNair's Stonerside, whose holdings were purchased by Sheikh Mohammed's Darley last year.

Stonerside bred last year's Breeders' Cup Classic (gr. I) winner Raven's Pass, who is owned by Princess Haya of Jordan and Darley. The Harkins award is presented to the TTA member whose efforts and contributions to the association and the industry have helped to further the goals of the TTA. The award is not required each year but is discretionary on the part of the TTA awards committee and board of directors.

Stealth Cat, bred by James Kenney and Jann Jones, and owned by J. Kirk Robison, was named 2008 Texas Horse of the Year and champion older female. The daughter of Magic Cat—Dixie's Integrity, by Mr. Integrity, won five of 11 starts last year, including the \$100,000 Valid Expectations Stakes at Lone Star Park. She finished the year with earnings of \$213,836.

"When the army did away with the cavalry after World War II, they started sending all these cavalry officers to the allied officer school, and they would come to the riding school and teach us. We could ride without reins and stirrups and jump through grids over four-foot-high fences. It was like flying. You can't get a riding education like that anymore."

As a young rider, Hutchins also became active in the Pony Club organization, an involvement that continues to this day. She currently works with several Texas chapters of the Pony Club, judging horse shows and taking the girls on trips to Retama Park, complete with backside tours.

Hutchins graduated from Auburn University with a degree in animal science and a major in biochemistry and nutrition. While she was in college, she taught riding for the P.E. classes and exercised polo ponies.

"I spent a lot more time at the stable than I did studying, but I managed to get through," she said.

Although horses had been part of her life for years, Hutchins didn't get involved in racing until she and Tom moved to Kansas and bought a Quarter Horse. That first

runner won a 250-yard dash at Eureka Downs, and she was hooked. Eventually, she became a fan of the stakes-winning, grade I-placed Tri Jet stallion Triple Sec, who earned \$526,652 in six years and stood in Texas. She wrote a letter to his owner, Stanley Beard, which led to a phone call, which led to Hutchins thinking that she'd like to trade windy western Kansas for the warmer temperatures of Texas, where pari-mutuel racing had recently returned. Beard, who had a farm in Brenham, told her that the only place she should look in Texas was the Hill Country. She called a land agent, who turned out to be someone she knew from high school in Montgomery, and in 1992, the Hutchinses moved to Fredericksburg, 90 miles west of Austin.

"I'm so lucky to live here," Hutchins said of her home for the past 17 years. "There's a sign in my doctor's office that says, 'If you're lucky enough to live in the Hill Country, then you're lucky enough.' I feel like that's pretty true."

Bordered on one side by Spring Creek, Lane and Tom Hutchins' Spring Creek Thoroughbreds rests on a piece of land that once belonged to the 30,000-acre Morris Ranch, a Thoroughbred training center for the New York-based Morris family that owned the first Belmont Stakes winner, Ruthless.

"Max Hirsch, the trainer for (1946 Triple Crown winner) Assault, was born in Fredericksburg," Tom Hutchins said. "He rode horses for them out here at Morris Ranch, when they would ship horses here from New York. (Texas horseman) Tommy Oliphant told us one time that Max Hirsch told (King Ranch founder) Bob Kleberg, 'If you'd just let me take 20 mares and go to Fredericksburg, I'd raise you a Kentucky Derby winner.' "


Fredericksburg is also home to another legend, the 150-year-old Gillespie County Fair race meet, one of the oldest meets in the country. Today the Gillespie County Fair holds eight days of live racing each summer and year-round simulcasting in the adjacent Race Barn.

"We're very proud of our race meet here," Hutchins said. "The people come out in droves and bring their kids. Believe me, racing's not dead. Come to Fredericksburg and see. We have a really good time."

Her Triple Sec mare Sec Sea Lark, a champion sporthorse before she ever stepped onto a racetrack, finished third in a stakes at the Gillespie meet in 1996. The 17-year-old mare now keeps company in the Hutchins' backyard alongside 30-year-old Summer Kiss, whom Hutchins refers to as "the foundation mare." A daughter of Northfields, Summer Kiss broke her maiden at The Curragh in Ireland but made her mark on a small farm in Texas as the granddam of Sandburr. She can be found in the pedigree of most of Hutchins' horses, and may be responsible for their remarkable soundness.

"I don't breed for the sales," Hutchins explained. "I breed for longevity because I like to run them for years. That's the fun part, so that's pretty much my program."

That hunt for longevity made her a big fan of the Brazilian-born Sandpit, who raced through age 8, won five grade I races, and earned \$3,812,597. When he retired to stud in Kentucky in 1998, she hoped to



breed Lone Star Stella to him.

"I had a little more money back then than I do now because I was new to racing and hadn't spent it all," she said. "I called up to Vinery and they wouldn't give me the time of day. I had a trainer up there named Ronnie Warren. He had trained Stella and thought the world of her. He knew everybody and had trained for Mr. (Ben) Walden, who owned Vinery. Somehow Mr. Walden was able to find me a season to Sandpit, so I put her on the truck and there she went. Ronnie Warren is responsible for that breeding. It was mine and Tom's idea, but if it hadn't been for Ronnie Warren, Sandburr would not exist."

Sandpit died in 2003, but his six crops have earned nearly \$10 million. In an ironic twist, his chief earner is Sandburr, who finished third in the Star of Texas Stakes in his last start of the year. He has started once in 2009.

"Sandburr gets out on the track and plays around like a 2-year-old," said owner Marty Nixon. "The horse seems to be having a ball, and he's just flat out competitive. Lane is very kind, and she's all about the horse. She's always been quick to say that he has a home with her."

As Sandburr's connections begin to contemplate retiring the 10-year-old gelding, Hutchins stressed that she would never let him go homeless.

"My husband's clutching his chest, like 'No, no,' but he can always come back here," she said. "That was his pasture out there, so I still think sometimes I see him. He paid for this fence out here with breeder's awards. He earned more than \$100,000 for me before he left. You're supposed to look out for these guys. We owe them."

Hutchins put her money where her mouth is when she retired Little Brick Lane, Sandburr's older half-brother by Rare Brick who raced through age 9. After he was claimed from Hutchins, she kept tabs on his career, to ensure he wouldn't slip through the cracks, and claimed him back when he came up for a tag. He retired in 2007.

"I've got quite a few retirees here," Hutchins said. "I'm a total bleeding heart, and I don't make any apologies for it. I will probably start riding Little Brick Lane, but he doesn't have to do anything. He made close to \$100,000 and won 11 races, so if he never wears a saddle again, he doesn't have to worry about it. Mostly, I feed him and pet him."

Little Brick Lane is just one member of the Spring Creek Thoroughbred menagerie that includes two yearlings (nicknamed Miles and Walter), a 2-year-old, five mares, five geldings, a Paint mare, a tough little pony named George, and three dogs—Jack, Alice, and Trapper. Hutchins has two horses in training now with Eddie Webb, who also conditioned Sandburr.

"I don't know how many trainers could have kept Sandburr sound for seven years like Eddie did," she said. "He gets the major amount of credit for his success because if they hadn't gotten a sound, drugfree horse, he would have been done a long time ago. I think it really broke Eddie's heart when he left, but he is a supporter of his and very proud."

Training costs mount up quickly so Hutchins teaches riding lessons to help foot the bills. The work also helps keep her retired horses fed and happy.

"Racing wouldn't have such a bad reputation if people would make a plan for horses after they race," she said. "It all goes back to the owner. Horses live a long time, so have some guilt and make sure they go to a good home."

That straight talk represents exactly what Hutchins brings to the board of the Texas HBPA.

"I feel like I'm sort of the representative of all these people in Texas who hang on year after year, raising horses," she said. "I wish those people got more attention than they do. You see the big owners, which is what people want to read about, but there's this whole underbelly that's holding up the whole thing."
