Leonard Zenith's UpHill Stable finally hits its stride

BELIEVE IN THE WISDOM born from trial and error. Almost 55 years into horse ownership, Calgary, Alberta, attorney Leonard Zenith has hit his stride after acknowledging he's made every mistake in the book. Today, his UpHill Stable campaigns the brilliant filly Lightstream and has in recent years enjoyed success with graded stakes winners such as Clearly Now and So Long George and multiple stakes winner Crown Isle.

But Zenith is the first to tell you not to paint his story with too broad a glowing brush because he's spent decades toiling in the ownership trenches with cheap claimers that have largely cost him money, only to be repeatedly bailed out by a good one that has come along and repaired the financial picture enough for his continued participation.

Zenith, 71, is a native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, who began frequenting Assiniboia Downs in his early teens. At 16 he was walking hots and met lifelong friend and longtime horse partner David Miles, who was manning the booth selling programs and renting binoculars.

"I was mesmerized by the whole environment and subculture," said Zenith. "The animals, the people on the backside; we couldn't get enough of it. Everyone else thought I was crazy. According to my parents, there were three places a person shouldn't go: the pool hall, the brothel, and the racetrack."

Zenith spent summers in Calgary walking hots for trainer Leo Giardin, "a grumpy, crusty, difficult man who, for some reason, liked me." At 18 Zenith and Miles purchased Thorny Crown.

"We bought him from a guy named Honest John, but he wasn't," said Miles. "The horse couldn't run four strides."

Then came Bearden Acres, whom Giardin claimed for \$1,250. Zenith and Miles got out even on him.

Married and with a baby on the way while in law school, Zenith found himself in money trouble, with his wife needing to quit her job to take care of their child. But he and Miles had

claimed Game Boy for \$2,500, and he would subsequently run off three wins in a row before being claimed back by the guy they'd taken him off.

"That gave us a little bit of a nest to get through the pregnancy and birth time," Zenith said. "Our daughter was four months old when we moved to Calgary, and Leo called and said he could buy Game Boy back. My wife, who was unbelievable in agreeing to all this, said 'OK' and we bought him back and he won two more for us before we lost him again. He was the first horse I truly fell in love with."

Game Boy would go on to make 117 starts, winning 24 of

Miles recalled having a lot of fun in those early days.

"Leonard fell in love with a horse named Sam Sam who used to run last every time," he said. "So he decided we should go to the barn and buy him. He offered the guy \$200 for him and the guy threw a pitchfork at us. So Leonard says he's never betting the horse again, and the next time out he wins and pays \$60."

Zenith raised two children and fed a couple of mortgages but always managed to own one or two inexpensive runners.

Expanding his horizons, he visited New York for the first time in 1974, and coming from the bush tracks of Alberta, he was very much the gawking tourist once he hit the broad expanse of Belmont Park, where he met legendary trainer Allen Jerkens.

"Just like Leo, for some reason Allen really liked me, and our friendship continued until his passing," Zenith said. "He

opened up a whole new vision for me with the way he cared for his horses and the quality of them. I would stand at the rail of the training track for hours watching those horses gallop with their necks bowed. You could really see what a good horse looked like. That was a changing point. "Allen taught me a lot about horses and even more in life lessons. He was truly a mentor. We stayed up all night at his home once with him playing videos for me and explaining things. What a great experience."

Zenith bought the stakes-placed, Calu-

met Farm-bred Our Cadet from Jerkens and stood him in Alberta for several years. He also campaigned Our Cadet's son Worthy of Praise, whom Jerkens conditioned to win a \$10,500 claimer at Belmont in 1981. Said Zenith, "That win was the thrill of my life."

Nevertheless, Zenith struggled to remain involved in racehorses. His position was again saved by a claimer when the Verne Winchell-bred Magni Glo went on a six-race winning streak for Zenith at Fort Erie in Ontario in 1986, earning nearly \$20,000 on the season.

"He was a late-running sprinter who just got there in the last jump every time and moved your heart into your throat," Zenith said. "He was determined, and he kept me in this because otherwise I couldn't have stayed in the game financially."

As the century flipped, Zenith had a revelation, he'd lost a half-million dollars over his 30 years of owning cheap racehorses he either claimed, bought privately, or purchased at the Belmont paddock sale.

"In those days I picked out my own horses," he said, "and I really learned a lot, but everything I learned was from a mistake. I got sucked in by a horse's stat-

ure. My time working around horses gave me no knowledge of conformation whatsoever. So I decided to change my MO. My kids were grown, the mortgage was paid off, and things were OK. So I decided to go to the yearling market in 2001 and started UpHill Stable.

"I met Ron Fleischman in Lexington, and we forged a relationship and I've come to rely on him totally when it comes to conformation. Nobody has more knowledge about it than he does, and he became my compass and beam of light."

Around the same time, Zenith was at an art exhibit in Canada that his wife was putting on and was approached by a successful businessman and art lover named Jim Hill.

Hill picks up the story: "This guy was almost asleep leaning up against the wall, so I started talking to him and the conversation turned to horses. Eventually I went to Leonard's home on a Saturday and the entire dining room table was covered in *Stallion Registers* and *BloodHorses* and *Racing Forms*. Piles of them. And he lectured me from nine in the morning till four in the afternoon with half an hour off for lunch. When I left, I thought, 'Wow, that could have been terrible, but it was actually quite interesting.'"

Jim and his wife, Susan, bought 50% of four yearlings Zenith had recently purchased. One, Storm Caller, had some talent, and Zenith wanted to run him in an \$80,000 claimer. The Hills, though, had fallen in love with him and didn't want to risk losing him. The Hills kept Storm Caller, the partnership broke up, and today Jim and Susan Hill own Margaux Farm near Midway, Ky., which they've built into a world-class training and boarding operation; they have raced top runners such as grade 1 winner Grand Arch; they buy expensive yearlings; they own a B&B near Keeneland; and they're still friends with Zenith.

"I never dreamt Jim Hill would go in to the extent he has," said his mentor. "His involvement is 20-fold more than mine. He's a fine person and we have dinner a couple of times a year, but he gets upset when I don't stay at his B&B during the sales. I can't be socializing; I have to do my studying. I think he finds me crusty." Zenith's fortunes took a northward turn after he gave the sales reins over to Fleischman. They liked an Arch colt at the 2007 Keeneland September sale that showed a bad ankle on an X-ray.

"Ron has X-ray vision and didn't believe the image," said Zenith. "We took the picture to a radiologist and she said there was a defect in the film. That's how we got Crown Isle for \$20,000 (privately)

when everyone else was walking away."

Crown Isle won the 2009 Toronto Cup Stakes on the turf at Woodbine and the same year's Ontario Derby, making nearly \$250,000 in his career. So Long George, another son of Arch, was purchased in 2010 for \$50,000 and won the Nijinsky Stakes (G2T) in 2013, earning better than \$290,000 in his career. Zenith enjoys pointing out he defeated the Hills' Grand

Arch twice in his career. Kenny Leugene, who breaks the UpHill horses in Florida, suggested a horse to Zenith well back in the cobwebs of the 2011 Keeneland September yearling sale, which he bought for \$30,000. Sent to trainer Brian Lynch, Clearly Now at 3 won the Swale Stakes and Bold Ruler Handicap (both G₃) and at 4 took the Belmont Sprint Championship Stakes (G3) going seven furlongs in 1:19.96, the fastest seven furlongs in the history of New York racing, which Zenith witnessed some 40 years after he had stood at the rail of the training track watching good horses gallop for the first time. Sold privately after a 2015 win at Saratoga, Clearly Now has earned more than a \$1 million in his career.

Although he has turned conformation decisions over to Fleischman, Zenith does take some pride in his reading of pedigrees, which he's studied for his entire time in the game.

"When I started looking at catalogs, I kept seeing Bull Lea was all over these pedigrees, so I figured that meant something," he said. "Pedigrees play a big part in what I do. Crown Isle is by Arch. So Long George is by Arch. Clearly Now and Lightstream are out of Arch mares. Does that send a message? Last year we found an Arch yearling we're very high on who we've named Repair the World. When I look at a catalog page, I seek out what I call the "diagonal line," which is the sire of the yearling, the broodmare sire, and the sire of the second dam. Lightstream's diagonal line is Harlan's Holiday, Arch, and Dynaformer. Repair the World's is Arch, Seeking the Gold, and Seattle Slew, probably the best diagonal line you'll ever find."

Lightstream was purchased for \$55,000 at the 2014 Keeneland September auction. In her first three starts under Lynch, she won her maiden, the Adena Springs Beaumont Stakes (G3) at Keeneland, and the Soaring Softly Stakes on the Belmont turf. She has since added the Lexus Raven Run Stakes (G2) last season and is being patiently handled for a 2017 comeback race. She has earned \$463,000 to date.

"She was the first horse we bought that year," said Zenith. "We didn't know she'd become what she became. I liked a City Zip yearling better that year, and right now he's a 4-year-old maiden."

With Lightstream having become so valuable, UpHill has sold slices of her to Sol Kumin's Head of Plains Partners and the California-based Little Red Feather Racing syndicate. Zenith maintains control over her and has the option, under most scenarios, to run her through her 5-year-old season in 2018 if he so chooses.

UpHill Stable today is a 50/50 split between Zenith and Ron and Irma Desrochers, whom Zenith also brought into the game.

"When I wrote to the Desrochers about becoming partners," said Zenith, "I began my letter to them this way: 'It is inevitable

you will lose all your money. The only questions are how long it will take and how much fun will you have.' But that didn't turn out to be correct because with these good horses we're making money and we have tax problems."

Lest anyone think he's doing too well, Zenith is quick to point out in 2015 he paid \$115,000, the most he's ever spent for a yearling, for a City Zip yearling whom he recently sold for \$7,000; and paid \$30,000 for another yearling whom he just gave away. But his recent success has been impressive, considering UpHill consists right now of Lightstream and the maiden 4-year-old; one 3-year-old Bellamy Road filly; and five 2-year-olds.

Zenith bristled good-naturedly when told that Lynch called him "one of the lucky guys." Asked if he agreed, Zenith said, "No, I resent it. My take is that avoiding the purchase of bad yearlings is 90% skill. Buying a good yearling that turns into a good horse is substantially luck. Nobody has that kind of skill. But I continually see horses that we reject bring big money from people, and that never ceases to amaze me. We usually end up buying below the median for any given day.

"My first love is buying yearlings, and my second love is watching them develop into racehorses. In the afternoons (races) now, honestly, it's not as exciting as it used to be because I have too much anxiety and worry."

At a couple of points during our discussion, Zenith stopped and questioned whether he was boring the interviewer, who agreed with Jim Hill. Zenith is really quite interesting and is a formidable mentor who has learned horse racing's lessons the hard way. Which is the UpHill upside to trial and error.
