

EDDIE MAPLE COMES UP ROSES

Hall of Fame rider still enjoys the horses at Rose Hill Plantation Equestrian Center

ECAUSE EDDIE MAPLE RISES at the same time each day-5:10 a.m.—the retired Hall of Fame jockey notices daylight greeting him a bit earlier each morning this time of year. But as he gets out of bed and prepares to visit the barns at the Rose Hill Plantation Equestrian Center to start this March day, he perceives brightness even before the sun's appearance.

"The moon was so big this morning," Maple said from Rose Hill Stables near Bluffton, S.C., which has become home for Maple and his wife, Kate—a pair of empty nesters who've found their paradise in the South.

The Maples operate the equestrian center at Rose Hill Plantation, a property development that 960 families call home.

Most of the horses at the center are pleasure and show horses, along with Kate's retired Thoroughbred, Crandall.

"We've had a little dip in the temperature, but we've been up in the 80s already.

It's not a bad place," Maple said. "The gnats are horrible for about a month in the spring and a month in the fall. It gets hot, but I can remember Saratoga being a scorcher, too, and Long Island, N.Y., is no picnic either. It's seasonal here, but you just don't have the extremes. Maybe four mornings a year we have to go out and break the ice on the water in the paddock."

The temperate and scenic region—with its live oak trees and Spanish moss—draws visitors to nearby Hilton Head, S.C., but the pleasant area is only part of the attraction for the Maples. The other charm is a home

that allows them to continue their lives surrounded by horses. Eddie Maple immerses himself in that life.

"My day starts early. I get up at 10 after

five every single day and come down here and get things rolling. My main job is to do the feed because we have all sorts of horses with all sorts of backgrounds and some little problems—not so much physical but issues brought on by old age to where they need supplements," Maple said. "I pretty much handle that.

"Then I go home usually about 7:30, and we have two Corgis and I bring them back to the barn and they play for a little while and then we go for a walk," Maple added. "Then we turn horses out. We have 19 horses that go out in the morning. We have

five that go out from 12-4 p.m., and then we have six that go out from 5 in the evening until 6 in the morning."

As the Maples' sons Ivor and Edward

had moved to Atlanta for career opportunities, Eddie and Kate found themselves gradually moving South as well, in part to stay close. They settled at Rose Hill in 2006. Son Edward Maple has since moved to Boone, N.C., and he marvels at his 70-year-old father's work ethic.

"He said to me, 'Dad, you've gone full circle. You started mucking stalls and end up mucking stalls,' " Eddie Maple noted with a laugh.

The warm weather is welcomed by Maple, a Carrollton, Ohio, native who has been riding horses since age 12. He won his first Thoroughbred race as a teen: At age 17 he guided Swami to victory in 1966 at Charles Town Races. Within five years Maple had established himself in New York, where he rode some of the sport's most celebrated stars.

Maple, who rode many horses for Woody Stephens, nailed down the Racing Hall of Fame trainer's fourth of five straight Belmont Stakes (G1) wins with Brushwood Stable's Crème Fraiche in 1985. That marked the second Belmont win for Maple, who had guided Temperence Hill to victory in the 1980 edition of the 1½-mile classic. Maple won the Metropolitan Handicap (G1) three times, defeating Forego in the 1974 Met Mile aboard Arbees Boy and following with wins in 1978 on Cox's Ridge and in 1982 aboard Conquistador Cielo.

These days the race Maple says he's most asked about is his mount aboard Secretar-

iat in the final start of the Triple Crown winner's career: the 1973 Canadian International Championship Stakes (G2T) at Woodbine. Regular rider Ron Turcotte was serving a suspension, and Maple picked up the mount, guiding Big Red to a 6½-length score in the 1%-mile turf race.

"I don't tell many stories. Down here my ride on Secretariat resonates with the general public. Some of the other races are known by our boarders at Rose Hill," Maple said. "My name seems to ring a bell because of

some old press or whatever. They had me ride an old Thoroughbred in the St. Patrick's Day Parade here in Hilton Head about four years ago—that was a kick."

The early morning routine has carried over from Maple's riding career, where he estimates he worked the vast majority of horses that he rode to 4,398 wins from 33,974 starts. His mounts earned more than \$105 million in purses and 60 grade 1 wins.

"The fact we do this early morning thing

here—I've always done that. I would work horses for anybody any day of the week when I was riding. I rode 33,000 races, and I probably got on 30,000 in the mornings-that might be a stretch-but some mornings I'd work four or five horses, which was fine. That's what I wanted to do. It helped me stay light, number one. And number two, it was good for my business."

Maple retired from riding in 1998. As the Maples decided to move south, they looked for a home in South Carolina and were kind of hooked into the equestrian center, which was struggling when they arrived in 2006.

"I was supposed to just add my name

to another fellow who was taking this place over, and about two weeks before we were to sign the lease, he got cold feet," Maple said. "So we could have backed out I guess—it was a four-year lease involved. But we didn't. It looked like something we might enjoy, and it's turned into quite a business.

"There were six horses stabled here when we took over, so we had our head against the wall for a few years until it leveled off and people found out it wasn't a bad place to board a horse."

The equestrian center is home to 29-year-old mare Crandall, who was bred by Kate and fellow jockey Craig Perret from one of two mares the Maples boarded at Claiborne Farm.

"She's the apple of Kate's eye," Eddie Maple said of the daughter of Bet Twice. "She still does some dressage, no competition, but it keeps them both happy—the mare looks like she's 14. She's named after

a Southern Belle little girl who's now a big girl—she's married with kids."

With their location, boarders at Rose Hill compete at shows in Jacksonville, Fla.; Camden, S.C.; and Ocala, Fla.

Maple noted some pleasure horse owners in the region prefer the cheaper rates afforded through pasture boarding, but he believes the lightning storms that frequent the area make stabling a necessity.

"We have people call all the time and ask if we pasture board—meaning they want their horses to stay out because it's cheaper, naturally, to board like that. But because of the thunderstorms, I can't see it. We're just not that kind of people. We're real horse people—city horse people, racetrack horse people. We're not cowboys.

"People that are cowboys do that kind of stuff also—pasture board—but when these lightning storms come around—it is without a doubt scary. That's enough."

In 2016 when Hurricane Matthew battered the Hilton Head coast and region, the Maples loaded the 35 horses at Rose Hill on trailers and shipped to Camden, S.C. The Weather Channel is on the list of television favorite channels in the Maple household as they work to keep up with any developing storms.

Sharing a love of horses has been good for Eddie and Kate.

"It's important. She rode in shows and stuff from 12 and up until she went away to college. One summer...I met her at Monmouth Park and she was galloping horses for Jimmy Croll," Maple said. "Kate is a fixer. If someone has a problem with a horse, she's the go-to gal. It's the same thing she has with the dogs. She was that way with our children. She got that from her mom."

The Maples are enjoying their life together with horses.

"We have a lot of nice boarders. We're horse people, not people people, but if we like your horse, we're probably going to like you," Eddie Maple said. "That makes it more enjoyable. We really don't have much of a turnover, so we've got plenty of time to know people. We have three people on a waiting list, but we're just not a turnover place. I guess that's a feather in our cap."

Only 32% of all sires have a lifetime AVERAGE-EARNINGS INDEX higher than their mares' COMPARABLE INDEX.
