Shooting Star Thoroughbreds starts quickly with Chance It

MARY LIGHTNER WAS LOOKING FOR A CHANGE. The daughter of a trainer, Lightner had been training racehorses herself for five years but sought a way to remain in the business with fewer hours required at the track and more time spent with family.

A discussion during a sale at Keeneland last year prompted her to investigate starting a racing syndicate. Her due diligence led to the creation of Shooting Star Thoroughbreds, which this year began with a three-horse syndicate and a pinhook syndicate.

The result? In 12 combined starts with three 2-year-olds, Shooting Star's Thoroughbreds posted five first-place finishes, four seconds, and two thirds. That's an in-themoney rate of 92%.

Leading the way was Chance It, a son of Currency Swap who captured two legs of the Florida Sire Stakes. He is out of a mare who was adopted for \$250.

As a new year approaches, it's an understatement to say Shooting Star Thoroughbreds has been successful. Its journey has included an impressive mix of hard work, bloodstock/training expertise, loyal friends, and fate.

FORMING THE SYNDICATE

Lightner, her brother Raymie, and their father, Mike, attended the 2018 Keeneland September yearling sale to buy horses for David Wilson, a client in California. While enjoying lunch with friends at the Thor-

oughbred Club, Mike's high school classmate Billy Ballard became inquisitive.

"What about these syndicates? What do you know?" Ballard asked. "It seems like they're becoming pretty popular."

The facial expressions at the table suggested not much was known about such ventures. Upon leaving Keeneland, Mary went to work researching syndicates. It wasn't long before the Lightners, with Mary leading the charge, decided to bet on syndication.

"We huddled and said, 'That's what we do; pick out weanlings and yearlings. Why don't we just try it?' "Mary said.

Mary and friend/managing partner Lisa Goodin operate the business. Raymie lends his bloodstock expertise, and Mike helps train on the farm near Williston, Fla. (Mary's sister, Molly, is employed by breeder Becky Thomas' Sequel New York and does not work for Shooting Star.)

"My goal is to bring people into racing," said Mary, 46. "There are so many people who are really interested and want to get involved, but they have no idea how to do it. They wouldn't know how to select a horse,

or how to select a trainer. Financially, it's a lot of money. I kind of make a price point for these people where they can get in and enjoy the fun."

Raymie Lightner, whose résumé includes helping Rockingham Ranch buy champion sprinter Roy H, agreed with his sister.

"I thought it was a great idea," he said. "I think the future of the industry is syndications."

As word spread among the Lightners' friends, many were eager to take part.

"If this is something Mary really wants to do, we love Mary and we want to support her. Really, that's all we were thinking," said Cathy Roberts, whose husband, Bob, was a fraternity brother of Mike Lightner's at Eastern Kentucky University.

"I never thought that there might be a chance that we'd win a race or win money."

Although many of the syndicate members have enjoyed previous experience in breeding and/or racing, Mike Lightner likes to remind people of something he was told years ago.

"When people get in the horse business, you need to tell them it's going to be like going to Vegas," Mike said. "We're gonna guarantee you're going to have fun; you may make some money, and you're gonna have a nice time."

A DREAM SEASON

The initial racing syndicate offering resulted in 100 shares among 20 members at \$2,500 per share.

The horses were

• Chance It, a bay out of the Pleasantly Perfect mare Vagabon Diva;

• Island Commish, a dark bay son of Commissioner out of Bide a Wee Island;

• Most Sandisfactory, a bay gelding sired by The Factor and out of Pearl In The Sand.

The plan was to race, and at year's end sell the horses. Most Sandisfactory, trained by Peter Miller, had three maiden special weight starts-a second and third at Ellis Park, and a second by a half-length at Kentucky Downs. Shooting Star recently sold the colt to Miller. Island Commish went 2-0-1 in four starts in South Florida for trainer Saffie Joseph Jr. Irish Commish broke his maiden first time out in a maiden claiming race at Gulfstream Park Aug. 3. After finishing third in the Proud Man Stakes and fifth in an allowance optional claiming race, the colt won a starter optional claiming race at Gulfstream Park West. Sold to Matthew Schera, Island Commish won his first start for the new owner Nov. 20 at Gulfstream Park West.

Then there's Chance It, who finished

second first time out before breaking his maiden in a June 29 maiden special weight at Gulfstream Park. Next was the six-furlong FTBOA Dr. Fager Stakes, first leg of the Florida Sire Stakes series Aug. 3. Chance It won by 3½ lengths under Edgard Zayas and gave Shooting Star Thoroughbreds its second winner of the afternoon.

"We were in the winner's circle twice that day—it was like I was Bob Baffert," Cathy Roberts said. "It was just the most exciting thing in the world."

Chance It and Zayas finished second to Stonehedge's Liam's Lucky Charm in the seven-furlong FTBOA Affirmed Stakes Aug. 31 but then took the 1⁴/₄₆-mile FTBOA In Reality Stakes by 7⁴/₄ lengths under Tyler Gaffalione Sept. 28. The winner's circle that day included many syndicate partners and their families.

"Most of those people flew in from Chicago, Lexington, and they're just having a ball for their \$2,500 investment," Mary Lightner said. "They want to do it again, and maybe they'll get comfortable where they'll want me to buy a horse for themselves."

Besides enjoying the frills, syndicate partners have more than doubled their money this year.

"Years ago I owned one share in a stallion syndicate," said Ballard, 72. "When those things fail and you're still getting bills, that's not fun."

It seems the only potential negative of a spectacular initial campaign is that partners might be spoiled going forward.

"That's been the running joke among the families—we might have just created a lot of bad owners," Raymie Lightner said with a laugh.

GOING FORWARD

This year's success not only proved financially beneficial but presented Mary with a predicament: Should Shooting Star sell or keep Chance It? Although the Breeders' Cup had been a possibility for the colt, Mary de-

cided shipping cross-country and the significant entry fee were not in the best interests of the owners or a colt that had run five times in four months. After getting several outside offers to buy Chance It, Mary Lightner decided Shooting Star would retain the colt heading into his 3-year-old year.

"I did not think (keeping a syndicate horse for another year) would come into play, but then you have a horse like Chance It that could be a once-in-a-lifetime kind of horse," she said. "I kind of polled everybody and said, 'What are your feelings; what do you want to do?' And 98% of the people wanted to roll with it."

People who owned shares in Chance It this year only needed to pay a nominal fee that went toward food and training. Members could sell shares at a higher rate for the Chance It syndicate.

Mary Lightner had targeted the Nov. 30 Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes (G2) for Chance It before the colt developed a temperature and cough. She then took aim at the Dec. 15 Remington Springboard Mile Stakes in Oklahoma, though a recent herpes case at the track might alter that plan. While high hopes surround many 3-year-olds, more than a few syndicate members know the deal.

"This will be a difficult year because there are a lot of good horses out there," said syndicate member Ed Maggard, 74. "But Chance It hasn't really been hooked."

Besides the Chance It group, Shooting Star Thoroughbreds offers two racing syndicates for 2020, as well as another pinhook syndicate. No surprise, most of the current partners have re-upped. For the pinhook syndicate, up to a handful of short yearlings will be selected with plans of selling them in the yearling sales in summer/fall. A \$2,500 investment purchases 1% fractional interest. Last year's pinhook syndicate returned 40% profit on the investment.

The first racing group will be similar to 2019's—three 2-year-olds, with 100 shares at \$2,500 per share. There's a Brethren colt out of Run the World, a First Dude colt out of Tiz Alta, and a Constitution filly out of Real Strike.

"I like the Brethren; he's a good sire," Mary Lightner said. "I was looking at a lot of Khozans but I couldn't get one. With Liam's Lucky Charm and Smash Factor (stakes

horses from the first crop of Khozan), I need to get a Khozan. I haven't gotten my Khozan yet. But Brethren is a good Florida sire, and I want something to run in the Florida Sire Stakes. I want to win the Florida Sire series every year."

The second racing syndicate includes two 2-year-olds. There are 40 shares at \$9,000 per with a 2.5% fractional interest. There's a Prospective colt out of Vagabon Diva (Chance It's half brother) and an Uncaptured filly out of Striking T.

"I didn't want to have to run against (the Prospective colt) if somebody else got him, so I wanted him," Mary Lightner said. "The Uncaptured, she's absolutely drop-dead gorgeous. She looks like an athlete. Her mother's a producer of a graded stakes-placed stakes winner."

Optimism surrounding the Prospective colt derives from Vagabon Diva, who was adopted from a retirement home for \$250 by Fred Pace, a 68-year-old Winchester, Ky., funeral home owner and a longtime friend of Mike Lightner's.

"I saw she was out of a Storm Cat mare and by Pleasantly Perfect. I figured there's got to be a hole in her," said Pace, who has been in the game with broodmares and racing for more than 40 years. "So I went to look at her and she was a good-looking mare. I just had to get my vet to write a statement about my farm and how we took care of our horses, and I adopted her."

Pace and co-owner Dutch Ishmael raced Vagabon Diva's first foal, Trenton Traveler, with Mary Lightner training. Trenton Traveler won his first two races. Pace then told Mike Lightner to give the mare to someone who would take care of her. That led to Mary Lightner meeting breeder Bett Usher at a restaurant.

"I never go in this restaurant, and this one day I go there and there were only two people in the place—me and Mary," said Usher, who received Vagabon Diva in August 2015. "We were talking and she said she was Mike Lightner's daughter. I said, 'I know Mike!' This was just meant to be."

After visiting Currency Swap and viewing his races on video, Usher decided he was a perfect match for the mare. The High Cotton bay had gone 4-2-1 in 10 starts and won the Three Chimneys Hopeful Stakes (G1) and Amsterdam Stakes (G2) at Saratoga.

"We made a decision to breed the mare to him," Usher said. "We weren't ready for marketability; we wanted to mate the mare to produce a racehorse."

Usher and the Lightners had lost touch for a while, but after Trenton Traveler ran well, Mary Lightner told her father and brother they needed to find Usher to see if she still had Vagabon Diva. They reconnected to discover she did indeed, and they quickly purchased her son.

Whether it's Shooting Star Thoroughbreds' first year in business, or Chance It's campaign, the story is remarkable.

"We're blessed, that's all I can say about it," Mary Lightner said. "I was hoping that out of the three horses we could have one win at the special weight level, and the others win claiming races. When you've been in it, you know how hard it is to win races."
