BARBAZONS BUILDING ON THEIR SUCCESS

HIRTEEN YEARS AGO, JOE AND Helen Barbazon set out to impact Florida's breeding industry. Their goal for opening Pleasant Acres Stallions in Morriston, Fla.—just outside of Ocala—was simple: bring stallions with top-tier bloodlines to the Sunshine State. Today, a decade-plus later, Pleasant Acres Stallions has become a force for Florida's breeders, delivering on—and arguably exceeding—their original objective.

UNCLE MO SPEED YOU CAN SEE

Speed that shows early. Class that holds up in top company.

A precocious son of UNCLE MO, GULFPORT pairs pedigree appeal with serious class — from an exceptional female family, and built to get winners to the races fast.

Meet GULFPORT — a fast, flashy TDN Rising Star and Black-Type sprint winner who showed brilliance at two (maiden win at first asking, then a 12 1/4-length Bashford S. score — the widest margin in event history) and then backed it up in elite company: 2nd in the G2 Saratoga Special and G1 Hopeful, then 3rd in the G1 Champagne. At four, he proved that speed and class carried forward with two wins including the Bet On Sunshine S., a 2nd in the Black-Type Ring The Bell S. and 3rd in the King Cotton S.

Set among picturesque live oak trees and vibrant green pastures, Pleasant Acres is a full-service commercial breeding operation. The facility represents all facets of the industry, specializing in breeding, mare, yearling, and weanling care, as well as sales representation.

The farm's nine-stallion roster is loaded with horses with sought-after pedigrees and accomplished race records. Heading the stallion battery is Verifying who stood the 2025 breeding season for \$10,000 and is a dual hemisphere stallion. The son of Triple Crown winner and Horse of the Year Justify is out of the graded stakes-winning Repent mare Diva Delite, also the dam of the brilliant racemare and champion Midnight Bisou. Verifying banked \$852,706 and was 3-for-11 in lifetime starts, including the Indiana Derby (G₃) at 3. He was runner-up in the Champagne Stakes (G1) at 2 and finished second in the Blue Grass Stakes (G1), the H. Allen Jerkens Memorial Stakes (G1), and the Matt Winn Stakes (G3) as a sophomore. Verifying's first foals are yearlings in 2026.

Grade 1 winner Doppelganger, who stood last year for \$10,000, is a 2019 son of perennial leading sire Into Mischief out of the stakes winner and multiple graded stakes-placed Quiet American mare Twice the Lady. Doppelganger captured the Carter Handicap (G1) at 4 en route to amassing earnings of \$554,900. Like

Verifying, Doppelganger welcomed his first foals in 2025.

Mr Fisk, by the late champion Arrogate, an earner of more than \$17 million, won the 2024 Hollywood Gold Cup (G2) at 4 as well as that year's Californian Stakes (G3). At 3, he won the Native Diver Stakes (G3), and all told, earned \$369,700 while winning 5-of-11 starts in his career. Mr Fisk, who stood last season for \$8,500, is produced from the stakes-winning mare Plein Air (by Manduro).

New for 2026 is Gulfport, a precocious stakes-winning and multiple graded stakes-placed son of the late Uncle Mo. Winner of the Bashford Manor Stakes at 2 in 2022 and runner-up in both the Hopeful Stakes (G1) and the Saratoga Special (G2), and third in the Champagne Stakes (G1), Gulfport added the Bet on Sunshine Stakes in 2024 to his list of accomplishments for trainer Steve Asmussen. All told, Gulfport enters stud toting a record of 4-4-2 in 11 starts with earnings of \$680,250.

"He has such a nice pedigree," Joe said of Gulfport. "He is a gorgeous horse. We fell in love with him as soon as we saw him. Christine Jones (Pleasant Acres' director of stallion services) and Jamie LaMonica picked him out for us."

Helen added of Gulfport, "He is a spitting image of his daddy, and his daddy stamps his horses. They are a certain type. He is that type. He is big and strong, and he hasn't even bred his first mare yet. What happens a year after they breed is they become like a weightlifter. He is going to be amazing looking. He is already."

STRONG SUPPORT

Despite the hurdles facing Florida breeders-particularly the ongoing concerns over South Florida racing and decoupling-Pleasant Acres has demonstrated resilience. The operation con-

cluded the 2025 breeding season with a robust 546 mares bred across its diverse stallion roster. The strong show of support from Florida's breeders is a fact that the Barbazons value and appreciate.

"I think it has a lot to do with the pedigrees of the horses we brought in," noted Joe of the successful breeding season. "We have invested a lot to bring these studs to Florida. But it's the only way we can be better here. You must spend a little to get this kind of quality.

"I give a lot of credit to Jamie (LaMonica) and to Christine (Jones)," he continued. "I basically just tell them to find us a stallion and then they work hard, beating the bushes to make it happen. I give the credit to those two. We are happy with what we've been able to do. We have had some good years with the stallions we have."

Of the headwinds facing Florida's Thoroughbred industry, Helen said, "It's not easy with everything going on here in the industry. But Florida is the best place to raise a baby, and that's what it all boils down to. I don't care what state you are in; I know Kentucky has bluegrass, and New York has the program, but the ground in Florida is as good as anywhere. The horses can stay outside, move around, run, and they love the sunshine. They can be horses. In New York, they can be locked up inside with ice and snow and the same in Kentucky for part of the year. There is always something here in Florida for horses as far as the racing industry goes. We'll fight for this industry in Florida. It's too

good of a location not to fight for.

"And we love what we are bringing here for Florida's breeders," she continued. "We have sons of quality sires, the best of the best. It makes us feel good and proud to show people our roster of stallions. Hopefully, we'll be doing this for a long time to come."

Ocala/Marion County offers a distinct and powerful advantage for horsemen accustomed to the winters in the north. Joe emphasizes that the yearround warmth and favorable conditions in Central Florida play a fundamental role in the health and conditioning of equine athletes.

"Ocala has the sunshine. The horses can be outside more unlike up north in the wintertime when they are stuck in stalls," Joe said. "Here, it's rare that you put horses in because of weather. Mother Nature has a lot to do with why Florida is so healthy for horses."

LENNILU A BREAKOUT STAR FOR LEINSTER

While Pleasant Acres is known for standing high-profile stallions, one stallion has turned into an unexpected sensation. Leinster, who will stand the 2026 season in New York, generated headlines modest fee of just \$2,500, he made an instant impact. The undisputed star of his initial areas in 2025 with his first crop. Standing for a initial crop was the 2-year-old filly Lennilu. The gray/roan filly, who was bred 불형

by the Barbazons, announced her presence by winning the first two starts of her career, including the Royal Palm Juvenile Fillies Stakes on turf at Gulfstream Park. Her 3¾-length triumph in that event earned her a coveted berth in the Queen Mary Stakes (G2) at Royal Ascot.

While the Barbazons sold Lennilu at the 2024 Ocala Breeders' Sales Winter Mixed Sale, they could not pass up a trip to England to watch her take on some of the world's best juveniles in her third career start. Trained by Patrick

Biancone for the partnership of Amy Dunne, Caitlin Dunne, Brenda Miley, Jean Wilkinson, Hoffman Family Racing, Tranquility Lake Farms, and Maury and Christopher Harrington, Lennilu finished third in a determined effort in the Queen Mary last June.

"That was such a special moment for

us," shared Helen of the trip to Royal Ascot. "We thought that this might never happen again and was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, so we packed our bags and went to England. She ran so big. She is something else. We're so proud of her. It was exciting for us."

Returning home, Lennilu showed no

ill effects from her sojourn across the pond. She won the FTBOA Florida Sire Desert Vixen Stakes and, fittingly, the Leinster Hollywood Beach Stakes in September. Her impressive freshman season concluded with an unplaced finish in the Oct. 31 Breeders' Cup Juvenile Turf Sprint (G1T) at Del Mar.

"She is a little pistol, and she is like one of our kids," Helen said of Lennilu. "We are so proud of her and the entire team that raised her and races her."

HUMBLE ROOTS

Joe, originally from Louisiana, and Helen, who hails from New York, both consider Florida home. The Barbazons met in the early 1980s while working at Noel Hickey's Irish Acres Farm in Florida. They were married in 1983. They have one son together, Travis, and Joe has a son, Ryan, from a previous marriage.

Pleasant Acres initially opened its gates on a 10-acre parcel of land and today encompasses more than 200 acres.

"Our success is way beyond what I ever dreamed of," Joe said. "When I was young, growing up in Louisiana, there was not much there. I always dreamed of having 10 acres with a horse. I never in my life dreamed I would have this. It's a dream come true. When Helen and I started and had our own place on 10 acres, we would get so excited just to have a winner. Now, we have all of this, and we have accomplished everything we wanted to. The horse business has been great to us. We love it."

A defining characteristic of the Barbazons' success is their handson dedication and an active commitment to bolstering Florida's breeding industry.

"It makes us feel good and warms our hearts that breeders support what we do here," Helen said. "We try-no matter who it is or what type of mare they haveto treat everybody with respect. We know that we have a stallion

for everyone, and we want them to breed their mares here. Everyone starts somewhere. We pride ourselves on helping Florida's breeders. We are still Florida breeders, and we have been where some breeders are today. People gave us breaks along the way and we love returning the favor with the people in Florida."

Joe added, "We get a lot of appreciation from Florida's breeders. That means a lot to us. They tell us, 'Thank you,' all the time for bringing in well-pedigreed stallions. I hope we will be here bringing good studs in for Florida's breeders until I die. It's in my blood and I take a lot of pride in Pleasant Acres and what we're doing.

"It's seven days a week," Joe added. "I

hate being in the office. I'm outside all the time. Helen and Christine handle all the paperwork and the people. Everyone here is good at their job, and without Helen and Christine, I would not be here. They are the backbone of Pleasant Acres."

INDUSTRY RECOGNITION

While the Barbazons are known for standing stallions, they are no strangers to breeding top caliber stakes winners. The couple bred 2009 Florida Horse of the Year Presious Passion, who nearly ran away with the 2009 Breeders' Cup Turf (G1T) at Santa Anita. The gelded son of Royal Anthem opened 10 lengths on an

international field before being caught late by Conduit, ultimately finishing second. Campaigned by Patricia Generazio, Presious Passion, who is still a resident of Pleasant Acres today, was a multiple grade 1 winner who banked more than \$2.6 million in a stellar career.

"He put us on the map," Helen said of Presious Passion. "He provided us with some of our favorite memories. He was special. His mom hurt herself and couldn't race, and we got her for a board bill. We liked her and her pedigree, so we bred her."

Presious Passion's achievements on the racetrack led to the Barbazons being honored as Florida's Breeder of the Year in 2009, the year after they received the 2008 Needles Award, given each year by the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' and Owners' Association to outstanding small breeders.

"The recognition makes us feel like we have accomplished something," Joe said. "It makes us feel like all the work was worth-

while. It makes us feel appreciated. We do all of this because we love it. We love horses; we love a lot of the people in this business. There are so many special people breeding to our stallions, and it is a good feeling to be recognized."

More recently, the Barbazons bred Arthur's Ride (in partnership with Tapit Syndicate), winner of the 2024 Whitney Stakes (G1) at Saratoga Race Course. A \$250,000 graduate of the Keeneland September Yearling Sale, Arthur's Ride ran his rivals off their feet in the Whitney. The flashy gray/roan son of Tapit proved 불형 uncatchable, leading nearly every step of the way to win by 2¼ lengths for owner Glassman Racing and trainer Bill Mott. Arthur's Ride is embarking on his own stallion career in 2026 at Taylor Made Stallions in Kentucky. His exploits on the track garnered the Barbazons yet another award, winning the 2024 Florida Broodmare of the Year Award for Points of Grace, the dam of Arthur's Ride.

"It's special whenever any of our horses run like that," said Joe of Arthur's Ride winning the Whitney. "We thought we were top of the mountain with Presious Passion. And to get another classy horse like Arthur's Ride and another grade 1 winner is what you dream about. We were loud watching that race,

let's put it that way. We will be sending a mare to breed to him. We're excited about his stud career."

For the Barbazons, the successes-from the breeding shed to the racetrack-are evident. Helen acknowledges, however, that despite the demanding nature of the industry, passion is an essential ingredient that makes the effort sustainable.

"We never dreamed that we would come this far," Helen said. "When we look outside our window,

it makes us feel proud. We're happy to be here and help people in Florida. When we were younger and starting out, it was tough to find good studs to breed to and we would try to send one or two mares to Kentucky when we could. It was tough to afford. Our goal was to start the farm and bring in new stallions every year for Florida's breeders. We want to raise the bar every year. We believe we've done that. Today, there are only a couple of big farms left here that have several stallions. We're very proud to be one of them.

"And none of this is easy," she added.

"It's been a lot of blood, sweat, and tears. But when it's your passion, you will keep getting better. If it's not a passion, why even do it because you probably won't excel at it. That's the key for everybody. Find your passion in life. Whatever it is that God has blessed you good at, that is what you need to do."

It is that fundamental truth that drives Pleasant Acres, ensuring that the Barbazons will remain a vital cornerstone of the Sunshine State's breeding landscape for years to come, BH
