Because Kim Lloyd had a comfortable chair, he got to be the fly on the wall when two of California's greatest horsemen swapped tales. After training hours at Santa Anita Park, Willard Proctor would amble by to claim "his" chair at Lloyd's barn. On Tuesdays, Charlie Whittingham would often show up and grab the only other chair.

"I would sit on a wash bucket and listen," Lloyd said. "They'd tell the same stories about good horses. I loved that—it was the greatest."

Lloyd has listened and learned from many good horsemen, beginning with his grandfather and continuing after he set out from his Oklahoma roots. He traveled with barns up and down the East Coast and into Kentucky before moving to Southern California, where he struck out on his own as a trainer.

Today, as vice president of sales, Lloyd helps Bill Baker, vice president and controller, manage Fairplex's Barretts sale company. The lessons gleaned from his mentors have given Lloyd the foundation to analyze young horses for Barretts' yearling and 2-year-old markets.

This year Lloyd has taken on another duty as the equine manager for Fairplex. He helps oversee the September fair race meeting, the training facility, and the vast array of horse shows at the Pomona, Calif., complex throughout the year.

Jerry McMahon, Barretts' former president and general manager, hired Lloyd in 2006. When McMahon left the company in late 2008, Baker and Lloyd stepped up their involvement. Baker had worked with McMahon from the founding of Barretts in 1989, the two joining the fledgling company after stints with the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association.

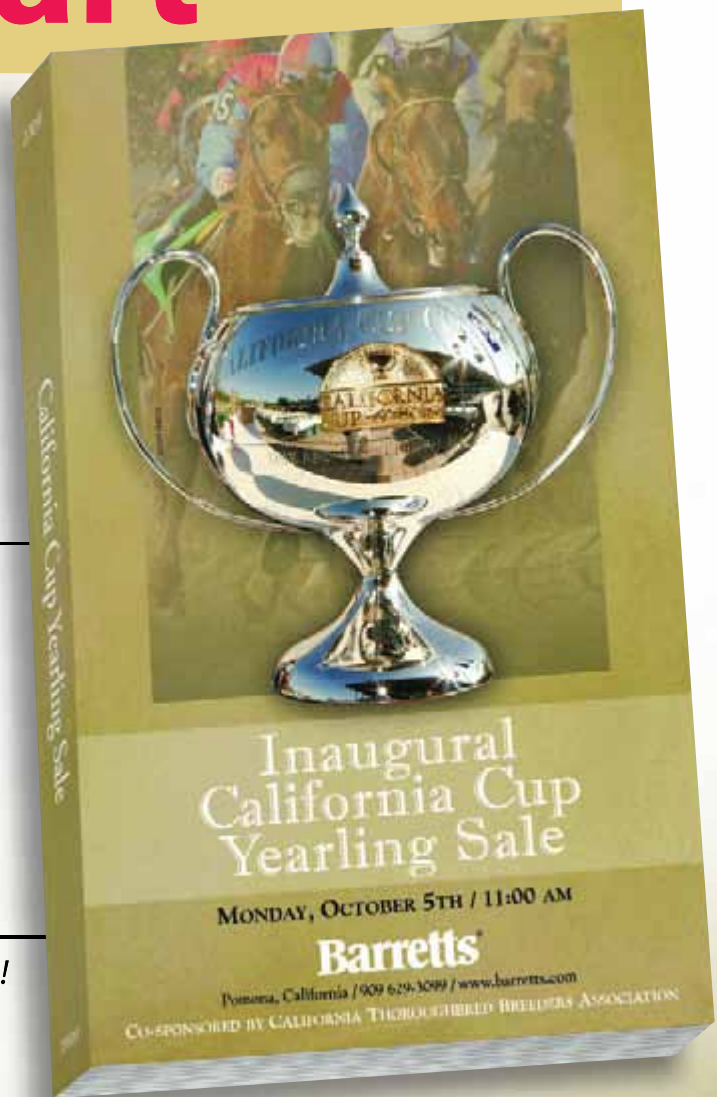

“Bill’s a smart sonofagun,” Lloyd said.

Barretts’ March 2-year-old select auction has been the focal point from the beginning, but the May juvenile sale has grown in recent years. When the CTBA abandoned its Del Mar yearling sale after 2004 and joined forces with Barretts, the October yearling sale took on more importance.

Like all other auction companies, Barretts is affected by the tough economy. Figures are down significantly at nearly all sales, and the uncertainty of Hollywood Park and Santa Anita’s future has made buyers nervous, Lloyd conceded.

“That being said, racing’s not going away in California,” he added. “It’s the most competitive, and it will come back. Yes, it’s going through tough times, but these are also opportune times to make some changes for the better. The opportunity for discussion is better than it was before.”

For example, the Barretts sale pavilion now doubles as the Fairplex simulcast site, instead of bettors having to find their way to the grandstand in the middle of the fairgrounds. That has led to a 20% increase in handle, according to Baker, who added that the pavilion was also leased for a Quarter Horse sale in early August.

For 2009, Barretts has repositioned the yearling sale, co-sponsored with the CTBA, around the California Cup. Barretts has cataloged 282 horses for the California Cup Yearling Sale Oct. 5, two days after California Cup XX at Oak Tree, instead of later in the month as in years past.

Lloyd feels the new owner incentive (see page 3476) for California-breds will help the upcoming sale.

“When your horse breaks its maiden in an allowance in Southern California, whether it’s Cal-bred or open, you get a \$20,000 bonus as an owner,” Lloyd said. “In Northern California, you get a \$10,000 bonus. But it has to be maiden allowance, not claiming. That’s a big incentive. That makes wanting to go buy a yearling a lot more attractive.”

Lloyd sees longer-term benefits from the bonus as well for the California breeding industry. He said that breeders are already talking about bringing more mares to the state to take advantage of the program.

Both Lloyd and Baker travel throughout the country talking to consignors and getting horses for the sales. As Florida consignors have retrenched to save money, the two have had to work harder at attracting quality horses.

“We offer great facilities, and we offer California,” said Lloyd. “I spend a lot of

time on the road. Consignors know by our efforts that we intend to be successful and continue to provide the service that we have always provided at Barretts.”

Recent sales graduates have included Wood Memorial (gr. I) winner I Want Revenge, Jim Dandy Stakes (gr. II) winner Kensei, and Japan Dirt Derby winner Testa Matta. Lloyd chooses horses based on pedigree and conformation for the select sales, making use of his knowledge as a former trainer.

OKLAHOMA BEGINNINGS

Lloyd first learned about horses from his grandfather. Born 54 years ago in Shattuck, Okla.—“a long way from nowhere,” said Lloyd—young Kim began traveling with his grandfather, Harry Lloyd, during the summers to nearby racetracks. Harry farmed during the year and brought his horses up from the fields in March.

“They’d jog and gallop them for 30 days and breeze them a couple times,” Kim

said. “They had a little short bush meet in Laverne, where I grew up. They’d run them once to get a trial race in them. Then they’d ship to La Mesa Park and go to Denver or Omaha, and they’d always finish up in Albuquerque.”

As a young boy, Kim posed with his grandfather for winner’s circle pictures, and he absorbed lessons about hardscrabble racing. The horses were as tough as the people.

“They’d bring the horses back to town, patch them up, and turn them out with cattle for the winter,” Lloyd said. “The horses would eat what the cattle ate.”

By the following March, the horses were thin with full winter coats. They’d get wormed, ponied next to pickup trucks, and started back into training, year after year, sometimes till the horses were 10.

Lloyd’s family moved from Laverne to Oklahoma City and on to Tulsa, as dictated by the sales jobs his father, Skeet, held. Kim attended the University of Central Oklahoma in Edmond for a year but couldn’t decide what he wanted to do with his life.

At the time, his father had a homebred filly racing in Louisiana.

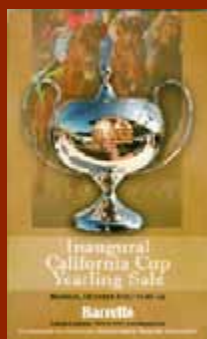
“If you don’t want to go back to school, why don’t you go down there and see what they’re doing with that filly,” Skeet told his son.

Kim spent a couple of weeks at Louisiana Downs in the summer of 1975. That caused him to miss the start of the fall semester, and his dad suggested that he travel to Oaklawn Park in Hot Springs, Ark. Kim grabbed the idea, hopped into his Corvair, and drove to Arkansas, ar-

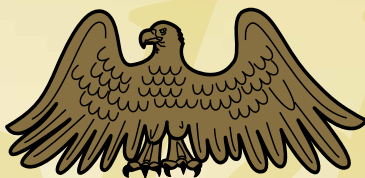

riving on the afternoon of Feb. 1.

Lloyd tried to talk his way onto the backside to get a job. The security guard wouldn't admit him but recommended asking someone the next morning to sign him in.

"I slept in my car, and froze my butt off, in the parking lot across the street," Lloyd said.

It took two nights in the car before luck turned his way. A man asked him if he wanted to walk hots by the head. Lloyd didn't even understand the term, but when told that he could get \$2 for every horse he walked, he said, "I'll walk all you got."

After spending some of his hot-walking money at the track kitchen for breakfast—his first meal in two days—Lloyd found leading trainer David Vance's barn and talked his way into a job and a tack room for a place to stay that night.

Lloyd moved on to Glenn Hild's barn later that meet, graduating from walking hots to grooming the ponies to feeding the barn. Finally, he was allowed to groom some of the racehorses.

"Hild taught me a lot about horses," Lloyd said. "He was a really good horse-

man. The first three horses I got were the two oldest horses in the barn and a filly who was a little crazy. The reason you got those horses is because they wanted you to

learn on something you had to work on."

Lloyd learned about bandaging and icing horses from equine legs that had seen plenty of wear and tear. He followed the Midwestern circuit first with Hild and then for five years with Dave Andis.

"He taught me more about horses' legs and taking care of horses than anybody I was ever around," said Lloyd of Andis. "We'd leave home with horses from Hot

Springs, and we'd come back at the end of the year with the same horses. He taught me about the use of different kinds of leg paints for different problems, when to sweat a horse, and how to ice."

Lloyd would spend hours rubbing a horse's legs, literally rubbing the filling out of them by improving the circulation.

"It's the best thing you can do for a horse," he said. "We'd work on a horse's legs twice a day—once in the morning and again in the afternoon."

One of the best horses Lloyd groomed was the sprinter Skipat, a 1974 daughter of Jungle Cove—Conquian, by Primera, when he worked for Danny Hasbany. During five seasons of racing, she won 14 stakes, including two editions each of the Barbara Fritchie Handicap (gr. III), Miss Liberty Handicap, and Miss Prosperity Handicap, the first at Bowie and the others at Meadowlands.

"She was the best mare in the world," said Lloyd. "If they had a Breeders' Cup back then, she'd have won it."

From Hasbany, Lloyd learned how to analyze a race and how to clock horses. Lloyd served as a groom, foreman, and eventually assistant trainer to Hasbany.

Once Skipat retired after her 1981 season, however, Hasbany decided to headquarter in Boston. Lloyd wanted to work elsewhere and found a job with Wayne Murty in New York.

IN SEARCH OF WARMER CLIMATE

Lloyd traveled all over the country working for Murty, seeing California for the first time and taking horses to Ocala, Fla. In

Florida, Lloyd met his future wife, Linda, and also saw Triple Crown winner Seattle Slew's first crop, which had just turned 2.

"They had Slewpy, Slew o' Gold, Slewacide—it ended up being nothing but runners," Lloyd said.

Lloyd was handling the Murty barn next door. One day Seattle Slew's owners, Mickey Taylor and Dr. Jim Hill, were examining the young horses. Lloyd wan-

dered over and joined the group.

"We came to the last one, Slew o' Gold," Lloyd said. "I'll never forget looking at Slew o' Gold. I remember Dr. Hill standing there saying, 'I hope these horses can run because I don't want to have to go back to work.' I said to him, 'Dr. Hill, you won't ever have to worry about going back to work.' He looked at me like yeah, yeah, but I had watched

NEW BONUS FOR CAL-BRED MAIDEN SPECIAL WINNERS SET

Enhancements to the California-bred incentive and racing program will begin in late September during the Oak Tree Racing Association meet at Santa Anita and the California Authority of Racing Fairs meet at Golden Gate Fields. The additions are the result of an agreement reached by the California Thoroughbred Breeders Association, Thoroughbred Owners of California, and various racing associations.

With temporary funding from the California Marketing Committee, a bonus will be paid to all California-bred maiden special weight winners in the state beginning Sept. 30. A \$20,000 bonus will be paid to owners of maiden special weight winners in Southern California, and \$10,000 will go to owners of maiden special weight winners in Northern California.

Long-term funding for the program will hopefully be provided by legislation that both re-allocates a small portion of existing incentive award money as well as an additional matching amount from TOC.

"We are optimistic that these significant increases in purse money and opportunities will certainly boost the value of Cal-breds and provide the ample return for those breeding and/or purchasing young horses," said Doug Burge, executive vice president and general manager of CTBA. "With the Breeders' Cup once again being held during Oak Tree, this is the opportune time to show the rest of the country just

how much more valuable Cal-breds will become."

Added Marsha Naify, TOC chair, "The TOC is proud to partner with the CTBA on this new program, which we know will benefit both owners and breeders in the state, and thus benefit the entire California racing industry. I look forward to working with the CTBA on more projects in the future."

Key provisions of the plan include:

* Owners of a registered Cal-bred maiden shall be paid a \$20,000 owner's bonus for winning a maiden special weight race in Southern California, and a \$10,000 owner's bonus for winning a maiden special weight race in the North, to be paid directly to the owner within 30 days of the win.

* California-bred maiden \$40,000 claiming races in Southern California will be raised to \$50,000-\$40,000. California-bred \$50,000 or less maiden winners will be eligible for the current \$40,000 or less start races.

* State-bred wins will not be considered for eligibility purposes in open first condition allowance races for 2-year-olds. This includes wins in any state-bred 2-year-old stakes. State-bred wins will also not be considered for eligibility purposes in open first condition allowance races for 3-year-olds. This will include wins in any state-bred stakes. And in all "two other than" open allowance races and above, all state-bred wins including stakes will not be considered for eligibility purposes.

Slew o' Gold train and he was unbelievable. Horses like that don't come around often."

The visits to warmer climates made Lloyd realize he didn't want to rub and train horses during bitter East Coast winters any longer. When he returned to California in 1983, he knew he and Linda had found a permanent home.

"I said, 'I'm never leaving California,' and I haven't," Lloyd said. "I love California."

He and Linda have raised three children in the state—25-year-old Blake, 23-year-old Devon, and 17-year-old daughter Sarah. Lloyd went out on his own as a trainer on the West Coast, too, in 1988, but he first had to learn the California way of training.

"People think that California has fast times because our tracks are hard," he said. "That isn't why. They train harder here. The horses are faster, and it's more competitive."

The first time Lloyd took a set of horses out at Santa Anita, he sat on his pony at the finish line watching his horses jog off and enjoying gorgeous December weather, a welcome change from icy New York temperatures. All of a sudden he heard the

loud whack-whack of whips.

"I turned around, and here come three of Mel Stute's horses," Lloyd said. "They are driving these horses. In New York you

set off slow, and you then pick it up, breeze by the wire, and gallop out. Sitting there on my pony, I realized they do things different in California."

ENCOUNTERING PROCTOR

While still working for Murty, Lloyd was stabled on the other side of Proctor's barn. The first thing the legendary horseman told Lloyd—with his usual salty

language—was that he didn't want to hear any radios in the shedrow.

"The next time you see a radio, you throw it in the water bucket," Lloyd told Proctor, which instantly sealed their friendship.

Lloyd today speaks of Proctor in awestruck tones about the man's vast knowledge of horses.

"He had a 'knowing' about a horse," said Lloyd. "It was not a mystical thing, but it was a real thing. He didn't have a lot of education, but he was smart."

Lloyd likes to tell the story about when Proctor first won with Foggy Note, the dam of Relaunch, at Hialeah.

"He entered her with no whip," Lloyd said. "Everybody thought he was going to give her a race. He said, 'I knew she didn't need no whip.'

They got off her, and he got a price."

When Murty returned to the East Coast, Lloyd quit so that he could remain in California. It was a rocky start on his own because Lloyd had just one horse, an animal with a bad knee.

"I didn't know what I was going to do, and I had two kids," Lloyd said.

The California racing circuit was about to move south to Del Mar. Proctor knew

about Lloyd's situation, and the veteran trainer left a string of horses with Lloyd at Hollywood Park, bailing out the younger man at a critical time.

Lloyd trained on his own from 1988 until 2002. His horses included Autumn Days Handicap winner Starolamo. Proctor mentored Lloyd until the day Proctor died in October 1998 at age 82.

Lloyd had stopped by the barn to show Proctor a new feed supplement. He turned the corner and saw Proctor at the other end of the shedrow feeding horses. Lloyd no sooner sat to wait for the trainer to finish when a groom came running down the aisle. Proctor had collapsed just after adding water to a horse's feed.

Lloyd called paramedics, but he knew it would be in vain.

"He died doing what he wanted to do," Lloyd said. "He was at the barn. He was feeding his horses."

Lloyd quit training when the California workers' compensation situation became critical. Until the industry formed its own California Horsemen's Safety Alliance, the cost of workers' comp drove many of the state's horsemen out of the business. Lloyd found he had a knack for selling cars, but during those years he kept his hand in at the sales.

"It's something I always enjoyed," he said. "Training horses gives you a good perspective. You can tell what isn't going to stand training. If he's offset in his knee, then he gets a splint and the next thing you know he's got a suspensory because of the conformation. And you also know what does work."

At the 1993 Barretts spring 2-year-old sale, Lloyd had picked out Fu Man Slew for a mere \$8,500. As a 3-year-old, the colt finished third in the Frank J. DeFrancis Memorial Dash Stakes (gr. II) to Cherokee Run, later becoming a stakes winner himself.

Lloyd's background made him a natural to join the Barretts team. Serving as both Barretts' vice president of sales and Fairplex's equine manager, he keeps very busy, especially during this time of year, but the ever-cheerful Lloyd relishes the work.

"I'm having a blast," he said. 🐾

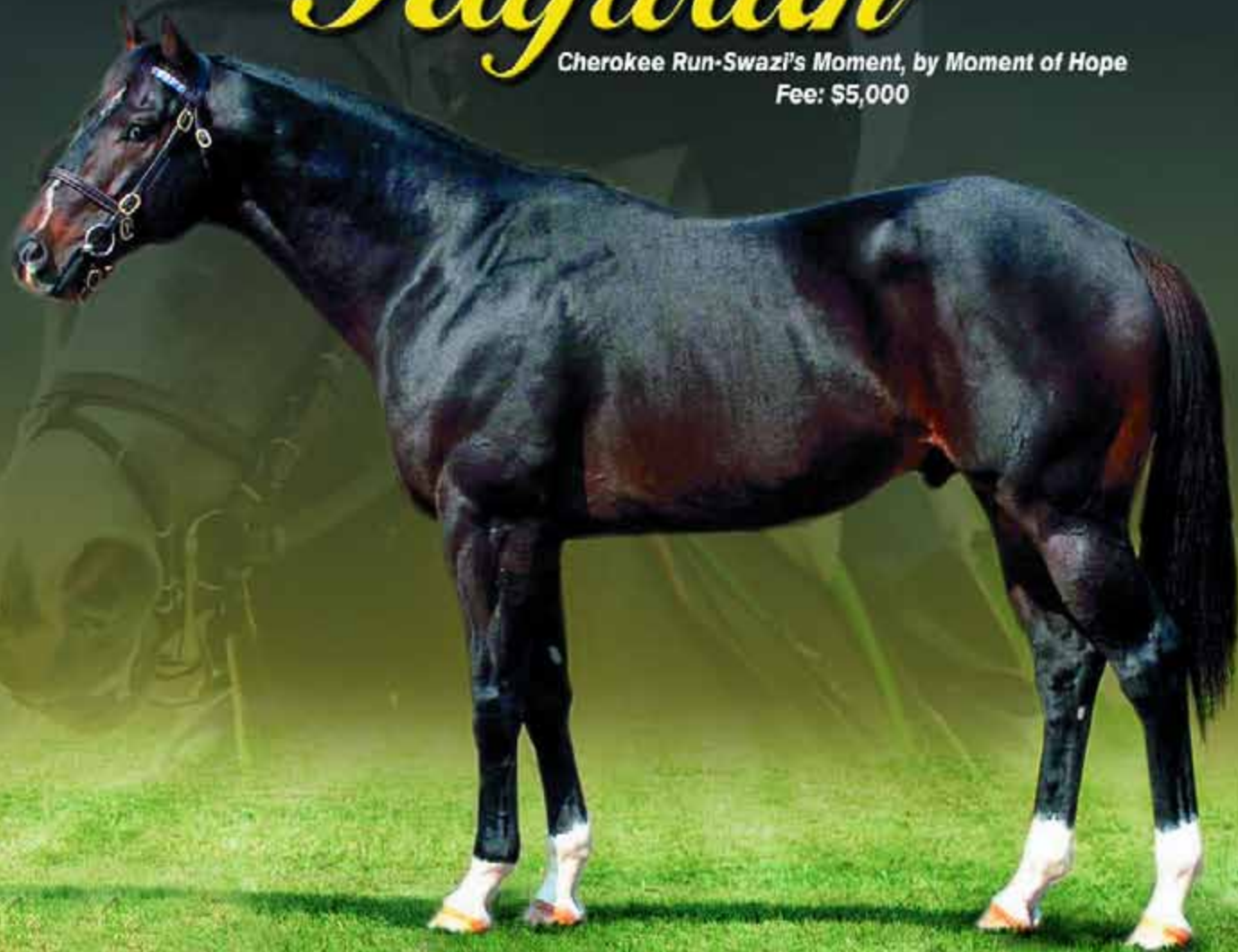
